# **Resources to Prevent and Mitigate Political Violence**

Last updated: October 18, 2020

- 1. **Concern about political violence is understandable.** We can all play a part in reducing the threat of violence and de-escalating if violence occurs.
  - For information about how to talk to your community about the threat of violence, start with resources from Democracy for President.
  - Organizations like Over Zero, Bridging Divides Initiative, and Braver Angels promote educational awareness and initiatives that can be implemented on a large or small scale.
- 2. **State and local officials can play a constructive role** in avoiding and mitigating the threat of violence. Public officials should make plans now to support the election and respond in the case of challenges to the fair election process.
  - Mayors: Over Zero has materials specifically for Mayors. Over Zero, Delivery
    Associates, and other expert organizations are offering pro-bono support to cities. Reach
    out to cities@projectoverzero.org.
  - Law Enforcement: <u>Crime and Justice Institute</u> developed resources specifically for law enforcement.
- 3. Voter intimidation is illegal and there are strict laws protecting voters and restricting law enforcement presence at the polls. Start with the Brennan Center's <u>Voters Should Not Be</u> Intimidated.
- 4. **There are legal options** to address the threat of violence from private militias and others. Start with the materials produced by Georgetown's <u>Institute for Constitutional Advocacy and Protection</u>, including summaries of laws in all 50 states.
- 5. **The First Amendment protects the right to free speech**, including the right to peaceful protest and demonstration.
  - There are numerous resources to support non-violent civic resistance. A compilation of trainers is here.

- Three-fourths agree that "it is hard to trust the results of elections when so many people will vote for anyone who offers a handout."

  - About one in five self-described Democrats and Republicans says that violence would be at least "a little" justified if the other party won the 2020 presidential election. About one in 10 of each group says there would be "a lot" or a "great deal" of justification for violence if their party lost the 2020 presidential election.
